Dear Commissioner Rose,

On behalf of our members and supporters across New Hampshire, Public Citizen writes with concerns about the lease of Mount Sunapee Resort to Och-Ziff Capital Management. In September 2016, the U.S. Department of Justice secured a criminal guilty plea by Och-Ziff for violations of the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act. Central to the criminal plea by Och-Ziff, the company entered into a three-year Deferred Prosecution Agreement. For years, Public Citizen has raised significant concerns with the transparency and accountability of such Deferred Prosecution Agreements, as they have proved to be inadequate enforcement and oversight mechanisms to properly hold corporate criminals accountable. As a result, the State of New Hampshire should not rely solely on the terms of the DOJ Deferred Prosecution Agreement as a primary instrument to ensure that Och-Ziff is a reputable steward of public resources. Rather, it would be prudent for the State of New Hampshire to insist on additional measures to ensure that a corporate felon is an adequate custodian of the lease.
